# Avenue City School is a Unique Beast

I wish I had a dollar for every time I had to explain to both St. Joseph residents and Savannah residents that Avenue City is its own autonomous school district and that it not part of either one of their "school systems." As most of us realize, Avenue City School possesses our own school board, our own policies, our own budget and our own way of doing things. Quite frankly, and to be a little one-sided in the discussion, its way of doing things is a lot better than most school districts.

In the 1950s schools across Missouri were forced with a decision about reorganizing and combining schools. Savannah, St. Joseph and almost every school in the state looked to see who they might merge with to create a bigger and better school system. However, the people of the Avenue City School District came to their own conclusion and decided that bigger was not always better. They also made a commitment to put their money where their mouth was and voted themselves a higher tax levy than their neighbors to keep their school just the way they liked it. Over the years, the school has grown significantly in building size and in student population. Yet, there remains something special about "the Avenue." I noticed it right off. After spending 30 years in larger schools and school districts, I came to work here and after one year I gave Avenue City my own personal nickname and called it "the island." To me, it seemed like the turmoil, stress and strain on staff, students and the general atmosphere just didn't exist at Avenue City. There was and is a feeling of tremendous parental support. The community and parental appreciation of the staff was overwhelming. Under it all, there was a feeling that the staff loved the children and the children seemed, for the most part, to love them right back and that was, and is, something very unique.

How long could this atmosphere last? Late last year, reality hit. One of our neighboring districts began a discussion about raising our high school tuition 75%. This was the first significant threat to happiness and harmony that I had experienced in the 7 years I had been at "the island" and I mean it was significant. The thought of our tuition payments going from \$200,000 per year to \$600,000 per year caused many sleepless nights. We began to prepare our defense/plea to our neighbor. They allowed me to speak to their finance committee. While I have never cared for committee work, I was thankful for the opportunity to speak to their work group. It was important to communicate that such a significant and immediate increase might, in fact, shut down the entire district. We also provided some statistics that were designed to assist our neighbors in realizing just how much value our Avenue City islanders actually brought to their district. To us, it seems as though the students of the Avenue City District bring a certain value to the area high schools above and beyond a simple tuition payment. In fact, all of the following numbers help the neighboring district in maintaining their accreditation.

- 1) In this particular neighboring district, while their attendance rates were hovering around 88%, the Avenue City high school attendance rates were 95%.
- 2) The average Avenue City high school student's GPA (grade point average) were significantly higher than that of our neighbors.

- 3) Our neighbor's 5-year graduation rate is 86.65% Avenue City's high school students had a 5-year graduation of 100%.
- 4) Our neighbor's ACT average score is 18.8. Avenue City's high school students averaged ACT score is 24.9.

Because the neighboring administration allowed me to address their committee, the district was able to temporarily avoid the initiation of a substantial tuition increase. Thankful and grateful can only describe our reaction to the administration's and the committee's decision to delay the increase in our high school tuition. Still, the dark cloud lingers out on the horizon like a tropical storm churning and building just off the horizon of our little island. If and when that storm hits, the citizens of the Avenue City School District will have some major decisions to make. Until that time, we will continue to do what it is that we do and produce great students designed to be our future leaders and decision makers. In addition to the knowledge they receive, we also hope that they take that caring kindness with them wherever they go and pray that they apply it in all that they will do. In today's world, that would be truly unique.

# 8 Ways to Prepare Your Child for Preschool

Preschool is often our children's first experience away from home. It can be scary for children and for parents. Here are 8 tips to help you and your child have a successful first day of Preschool!

- 1. **Meet the teacher -** Take your child to the Open House offered by the school. Help her become acquainted with the classroom, the teachers and the playground.
- 2. **Playdates** If you know a few of the students/families that will be in his class, try to organize a get-together at a park in the neighborhood to help him become acquainted with classmates. Or, if you're new to the district or do not know any families, take him to the

- park or a mother's day out program so he can become familiar with playing and sharing with other children his age.
- 3. **Practice separation** Leave your child with others for short lengths of time so that they know you will return.
- 4. **Backpack and lunchbox** before school starts, help her be excited about starting school by empowering her to pick out a backpack. If she is staying all day, she'll need a lunchbox. Keep in mind everything you have to fit in these items. In her backpack, she may need a special blankie or stuffed animal, room for an 8.5 x 11" folder, extra clothes and extra space for all that art work! You will need to put an ice pack in her lunchbox. Fill it with food you know she already likes.
- 5. **Independent skills** If your child is staying all day, ask him to help you prepare his lunch. That way, he'll feel like he has some control and will also begin to understand what is really happening that day.
- 6. Focus on your child Make the whole experience as fun as possible. Give your child your full attention on the way to school. Phone calls can wait. Tell her stories about when you were a little girl and how much you liked school. Sing songs. Try a spin-off version of "If you're happy and you know it, clap your hands." Make it, "If you're excited to go to school, clap your hands!" Be excited, smile a lot, and be happy for her.
- 7. **Communicate** Tell him it is okay to be afraid, but that there are always adults to help him and he can ask for help anytime. Promise him that you will pick him up in a few hours or after a certain activity at school like when the teacher sings a certain song or reads the last book of the day.
- 8. \*\*Don't linger\*\* When it's time for drop-off, keep your goodbyes short, sweet and simple. Give her a quick hug, tell her how much you love her, and leave her in the hands of the capable teacher. Even if she's crying hysterically, she will likely only cry for a few minutes once you're out of sight. But if you linger, the crying will probably last longer.

Do you have a child that is not yet in school? Did you know that there is a program through the school for your child? Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a free program for kids birth to preschool age. PAT offers personal in home visits from a PAT educator, group activities, developmental screenings and referrals for more help, if needed.

Do you wonder if your young child is developing appropriately for their age? Come to the school for a free screening and find out. PAT is offering screenings for kids 6 months to 4 years old,

who are not currently enrolled in the PAT program. The screenings will be held the week of August 19<sup>th</sup>-23<sup>rd</sup> during school hours. Call the school (816-662-2305), beginning August 1<sup>st</sup> to get a day and time for your screening. # **Professional Development News**

The staff at Avenue City use the summer months to take classes, attend workshops, and work on curriculum for the upcoming school year. Several staff members are in the process of attending many different opportunities that will help them to grow professionally. This year, the district will be working on English Language Arts Curriculum. There will be a lot of time spent analyzing the standards required by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to ensure that our curriculum is meeting all of those requirements. With the help of the Regional Professional Development Center in Maryville, we will analyze our current curriculum as well as new curriculum to determine our strengths and weaknesses. More information regarding this process will be sent in each district mailing to keep parents and community members aware as to how this process is continuing to develop.

Early childhood staff and others have been learning about Conscious Discipline. This strategy is very clear on the brain-based research that shows what needs to happen for a child, a person, to be at the best mind state in order to learn. In Preschool and Kindergarten, the focus is on safety, feeling loved and being able to handle their upsets and use their big voice to speak for themselves and get what they need. This is HUGE in their development and how they will respond and handle situations for the rest of their lives. As they age, Conscious Discipline takes adults through the needs, the skills and the motivations that cause children to act out or to be their best, as well as skills for us as teachers to help them get there. If you are interested in learning more, there are a few free on-line parent resources; just google "conscious discipline".

Several Avenue City teachers will be attending Kagan Win-Win Discipline Workshop in July. This is a two day workshop that will focus on creating a classroom that promotes acceptable behaviors. Win-Win Discipline is a comprehensive program used worldwide and it boasts transforming our concept of discipline: "Discipline is not something we do to students; it is something we help students acquire!" The teachers will be learning award winning step-by-step strategies for most every discipline problem. This training will help staff with easy-to-use strategies for prevention, for the moment-of-disruption, and for follow-ups. Instructional staff will learn to recognize and respond differently to the seven positions that cause almost all discipline problems. They will also learn to change disruptions into learning opportunities. Teachers will be excited to begin implementing these strategies!!

# Aces Garden Club 2019

This year ACES Garden Club has had approximately 10-15 members coming each Monday to care for our community garden. We have been weeding, watering, planting, bug watching, plant identifying, and making delicious snacks with the foods that we are growing. We are excited to announce that we have seen Monarch caterpillars on our Milkweed plants! Second grade does a study on the butterfly life cycle, so our students are eager to see if they stick around this year to undergo their metamorphosis. Garden Club's goal for this fall is to make a spaghetti lunch for members using plants from the garden, like our spaghetti squash and tomatoes.
