Old Man Winter Makes an Old Man Out of Me

He may have died 110 years ago, but Mark Twain's comment still applies. "Everybody talks about the weather but, nobody ever does anything about it." While previously blessed in recent years with snows that occurred over the weekend, we have been seemingly hit numerous times this year with weather that has threatened to shut the school doors across NW Missouri. With that, comes the controversy of when and when not to cancel school.

When I have asked or overheard answers by students about what exactly the superintendent does, three popular answers roll out. 1) He's the boss of the principal. 2) He owns the school. 3) He calls off school. While two of these answers can be debated, the one no one disputes is #3. Quite frankly, nobody wants the job associated with #3. After 27 years as superintendent, I can probably find a lot of people who would say "He never got it right." I invite those people to take that part of the job any day they want it. It is perhaps the most stressful part of the job and I have hated it every time the alarm went off and I crawled my way to the truck to go "check roads." When I finally retire completely, it will be the part of the job I will miss least of all.

So how does calling off school take place? I venture to say that the "old school" superintendents hate this part of their job. Quite frankly hate isn't a big enough word. The "new age" superintendents rely on a third party to make their decisions. Perhaps they buy an assistant superintendent a weather station to hook up to his/her computer. Perhaps they take the easy way out and simply rely on good ole Mike to be 100% accurate on the nightly weather channel. Weather predictions cause the "old schoolers" to toss and turn all night waiting for that 4:00 A.M. alarm to go off so they can crawl out of bed and begin the process. They will drag a comb across their head and climb into the truck and start driving out to the worst roads in their district to see if what was predicted has happened, is happening or looks on radar that it might happen. While the weather man (person) can be wrong 75% of the time, the local school administrator doesn't have that luxury. He/she must make the call by 5:15 A.M. whether the buses can get through at that time AND if the buses can get through 2 hours later AND if the buses do make it to school he/she needs to make sure that the kids can stay at least until lunch time. Will the weather worsen and buses need to be recalled and the kids sent home early thereby negating a day and causing a full make up day to occur? All the questions have to be considered and decisions made while most of the world lie snuggled in their beds while visions of a missed school day dance in their heads.

It is quite ironic that somebody with no meteorology training or formal NASCAR driving training is out on the most dangerous roads at the most dangerous time of the day in the most dangerous conditions trying to make decisions about weather and safety. Many times the

decisions have to be made on days where the state and county have plowed the gravel and blacktops but some have to be made on days before they have started that process.

The last week of January 2019, brought wind chills of -25 degrees. About 10 years ago, our friendly weather people started using the phrase "dangerous wind chill." When I was a kid, I am not sure there was a wind chill and most certainly there was no "dangerous," knife-wielding, crazed wind chill. Mom just wrapped me up tighter with a scarf and mittens and pushed me out the door for the 7 block walk to Sherwood Elementary School. I don't remember ever being excused from school because it was too cold. Yet, here we are, the creators of a brave new world. A simpler, more brutal one, in some respects, but so much kinder in others respects. The ship that carries the idea of never cancelling school because of bitter cold wind chills has chopped its way through the ice and sailed out of the harbor. Because I am old, I will always delay cold weather decisions because sometimes that predicted wind just doesn't show up. I also do not know many parents who do not have to work when the wind chill drops. You see, part of the message about coming to school is about trying to create a work ethic. In today's world, many people might say "work ethic?" Man, he is old.

While you may get frustrated with calls and texts and website postings about weather cancellations this winter, know that I feel your pain. I just feel it all night long. In the end, the old schoolers will still roll out of bed, drive the roads, and make their morning calls based upon facts and not on predictions. The decisions may not always be convenient and in somebody's mind they will never be correct. In the mind of those students at "The Avenue" the only right decision is to not have class. In fact, many would say we need to dismiss every day starting on August 15th.

Here's looking forward to the next predicted Snowmagedon of 2019.

PACES Persistent Attitudes Create Excellence in Students

Avenue City students in grades 3-6 will begin an annual training program starting February 4th, to accomplish the end goal of running a 5K event (3.2 miles) later in the spring. Students who would like to join this group work on training for 12 weeks to develop endurance, agility, strength, and healthy eating habits that will enable them to compete in the Helen Davis Husky 5K. As we begin our eighth year of this training, students gain a new perspective of how to create a mindset of making their body physically ready to run a long distance. Avenue City students have always had a great showing at the 5K event and it is a great opportunity for students to work hard to reach a goal and at the same time, help another school to raise money for needed equipment and supplies for their own students.

Professional Development News

The Avenue City School staff recently completed a required CPR training, which included updated information about using an AED. Staff were given time to ask questions specifically about performing CPR on children and proper techniques to use on smaller sized students that are in our youngest classes.

New requirements from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) this year advise teachers to have two hours of dyslexia training yearly. The Missouri State Teacher Association has created four, one-hour online trainings to help meet this requirement.

We have had various staff members present information from science networking, new standards in math, Pathways training (our reading program grades K-2), and new library resources including Tumblebooks through the Rolling Hills Public Library.

As a school, we have used this year to create a positive behavior system in which expectations in all areas of the school are consistent and provide a positive environment for the students. We have revisited our expectations throughout the school year during in-services to discuss the success of how this has been implemented and make changes to what needs improved. This is an ongoing process that we will continue to implement this year and in upcoming years, but we feel this development has been a valuable tool for our students and staff alike.

As we are now in to the second semester of the school year, our staff will begin looking at opportunities to attend summer workshops and trainings. This will allow us to grow professionally and give us great information and access to new resources to use in the classroom to meet the needs of the students.










Avenue City Preschool
