The Sky is Falling Or Are the Schools Failing?

You say something long enough and loud enough even the craziest ideas start to become understood as truthful comments. Such may be the case with the argument that the public schools are not up to the task. My response is "Really?" The data in most Missouri schools just doesn't support that argument. That argument certainly does not apply in the Avenue City School.

In 2007, the Center on Education Policy (CEP) published a 38-page research paper that compared several different types of public and private schools. According to the CEP, "Taken as a whole, their findings suggest that students who attend private high schools receive neither immediate academic advantages nor longer-term advantages in attending college, finding satisfaction in the job market, or participating in civic life".

Then why is it that the TV, radio and almost every other available media source continues to spew the arguments against public education? What drives these ideas? Someone once told me in order to find the root of most desperate arguments one must simply "Follow the Money." Millions of dollars are being spent to fund the campaigns of legislators all over Missouri. The main financial backer wants reform. Reform not in public education but reform in the tax system that funds public education. Spend a million dollars here and there for a governor candidate or several House of Representative candidates to be elected in the upcoming elections. They in turn will pass legislation that just might lower my taxes for education by \$5 million. A ten-fold return is a good reason to make that kind of political investment. Other states pass tax vouchers, which send more taxpayer dollars to private schools. Missouri has discussed mandated A-F grades for schools. Those grades would be based largely on testing, which stigmatized highpoverty schools. Issues raising their heads in Missouri recently have included eliminating teacher tenure and adding money to private schools, through a tax credit system. Both of these issues collected signatures so that the measures could appear on the public ballot. One of the issues did appear on the ballot last year but was wisely defeated by the public. All of these measures have been supported by and received funding from the same individuals who make large campaign donations for the purpose of purchasing some key legislators' loyalties.

There is a war going on out there. It's a war of public opinion. When asked, the general public will give the public school system a fairly low grade. Ask that same pubic about their local school and the opinion of their own school is quite high. I believe that is exactly the case in our own district. The people in the Avenue City School care. They volunteer. They attend and support pancake breakfasts. They pass ballot measures with an overwhelming majority. When asked, they are there in full support. There are those who provide, give, donate, support, express appreciation and those are the things that drive your teachers. There is no greater feeling than to know that you're not in the battle alone. Fighting for what is best in education and what is best for your child(ren) is a battle best fought from two fronts. From the school side, the teachers do their part and, if the parents do their part from home, the chances of a successful child and a successful school effort increases dramatically. Keep up the good fight parents. Remember we are in this battle together and the winner will be your child.

What is R.E.A.D.?

Avenue City Elementary School has been fortunate to participate with R.E.A.D. The Reading Education Assistance Dogs program improves children's reading and communication skills by employing a powerful method: reading to a dog! However, not just any dog. R.E.A.D. dogs are registered therapy animals that volunteer with their handler as a team, going to schools, libraries, and many other settings as reading companions for children.

But Why Dogs? Learning to read is often less about intellectual limitation than about overcoming fears. Animals are ideal reading companions because they: help increase relaxation and lower blood pressure; listen attentively; do not laugh, judge, or criticize; allow children to proceed at their own pace; and are less intimidating than peers.

When a R.E.A.D. dog is listening, the environment is transformed, a child's dread is replaced by eager anticipation, and learning occurs. The handler is a skilled facilitator, shifting performance pressure off the child and providing support, while the child gets the supervised reading practice necessary to build vocabulary, increase understanding of the material, and gain fluency as a reader. Studies indicate that the results are significant. Participating kids make enormous strides in reading and communication skills while, along the way, building self-esteem, confidence, and social skills. Partnering with Mosaic Life Care for the 4th Grade Challenge



Avenue City School was able to participate in the 4th Grade Challenge. The 4th Grade Challenge is provided to area schools by Mosaic Life Care. The 4th Grade Challenge wrapped up with visits from KC Wolf and Kansas City Chiefs ambassadors.
