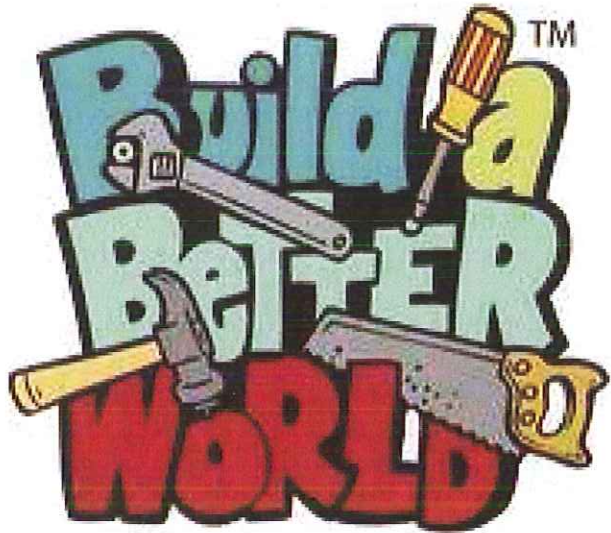

## Where is My Sunshine? My Only Sunshine

### Total Eclipse: Monday, August 21, 2017

On Monday, August 21, 2017 there will be a Total Solar Eclipse.

The following information is taken from The Weather Channel website.

**What is a total solar eclipse?** Essentially, it's when the moon moves right in front of the sun, covering it completely for a very short time. It darkens the whole sky, lets you look right at the sun (only when it's completely covered, though - you must use special solar viewing glasses (also known as "eclipse glasses") whenever the sun isn't completely eclipsed), and shows you the beautiful corona that surrounds the sun. Stars come out, the horizon glows with a 360-degree sunset, the temperature drops, and day turns into night. It's one of the most beautiful things you can ever see on earth.

**Aren't these pretty common?** Well, one happens about every year or every other year, somewhere on earth. However, you have to be situated in a very narrow strip of land (called the 'path of totality') if you want to see the total phase of the eclipse. Otherwise, all you see (with your eclipse glasses of course!) is a pretty boring partial eclipse. And that strip of land is generally VERY far off the beaten path - like Mongolia, or the Sahara desert, or the ocean somewhere. Very few people (as a percentage of the overall population) have ever seen a total solar eclipse.

**Wasn't there just an eclipse of the sun in the USA not too many years ago?** The only total eclipses that have happened in the last 40 years in the US were in 1979 (in the northwest part of the country only) and 1991 (Hawaii only). Anything else you saw was only a partial (and there have been lots of these, like on Christmas Day 2000) or an annular eclipse (such as the one on May 10, 1994). Those are NOTHING compared to the absolutely amazing spectacle of a total eclipse!!!

**I'm sure we saw an eclipse when I was a kid. We made pinhole viewers, and it was interesting - but not like what you're saying at all.** That's because what you saw was a PARTIAL (or maybe an ANNULAR) eclipse. You absolutely have to use eye protection to watch these types of eclipses, and you're right - it's not very exciting. But a TOTAL eclipse is something that cannot be described. If you go, then you will know....

**OK, so where do I need to be to watch it?** For the 2017 eclipse, there is a strip of land about 70 miles wide or so (called the 'path of totality') that stretches from central Oregon through South Carolina. There are maps on [www.eclipse2017.org](http://www.eclipse2017.org) that will show you exactly where you need to be, to be in the path of totality and therefore to see the total eclipse.

The Avenue City School District has made the conscious decision to make this event a fun and educational day. Avenue City School will be in session on this day. The students will be watching the eclipse from our own playground. The district has been busy planning educational / fun activities. A few things we are currently planning: outside picnic for lunch; watch the eclipse (complete with safety glasses); then fun game-style activities. PTO is planning to sell shirts during the summer months so that all students, parents, and staff can all wear them on Monday, August 21. Expect more information on this before the beginning of the school year.

## 8 Ways to Prepare Your Child for Preschool



**Meet the teacher:** If possible, take your child to Open House and let her play on the playground before school starts.

**Play dates:** Try to enroll her in a class where she already knows some of the other children or arrange a play date before school begins. Don't be shy. The children will benefit from seeing a friendly face the first day of class.

**Practice separation:** Leave your child with others for short lengths of time so that they know you will return.

**Backpack and lunchbox:** Before school starts, help her be excited about starting school by empowering her to pick out a backpack. If she is staying all day, she'll need a lunchbox. Keep in mind everything you have to fit in these items. In her backpack she may need a special blankie or stuffed animal. You may need to put an ice pack in her lunchbox. Fill it with food you know she already likes.

**Independent skills:** If your child is staying all day, ask her to help you prepare her lunch. She can stand next to you on a stool while you give her choices such as grapes or raisins, Grape or Strawberry Jello, and orange or apple juice. That way, she'll feel like she has some control and will also begin to understand what is really happening that day.

**Focus on your child:** Make the whole experience as fun as possible. Give your child your full attention on the way to school. Phone calls can wait. Tell her stories about when you were a little girl and how much you liked school. Sing songs. Try a spin-off version of "If you're happy and you know it, clap your hands". Make it, "If you're excited to go to school, clap your hands!" Be excited, smile a lot, and be happy for her.

**Communicate:** Tell her it is okay to be afraid, but that there are always adults to help her and she can ask for help anytime. Promise her that you will pick her up in a few hours or after a certain activity at school – like when the teacher sings a certain song or reads the last book of the day.

**Don't linger:** When it's time for drop-off, keep your goodbyes short, sweet and simple. Give her a quick hug, tell her how much you love her, and leave her in the hands of the capable teacher. Even if she's crying hysterically, she will likely only





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cry for a few minutes once you're out of sight. But if you linger, the crying will probably last longer. Overcoming separation anxiety and adjusting to school may be gradual. Give her your full attention at home whenever possible. Ask and answer questions. Listen and bond with books and play. Tell her that you are proud of her for going to school. Reassure her with hugs and often tell her you love her. Then you will hear the greatest words on earth, "I wuv u too, mommy."

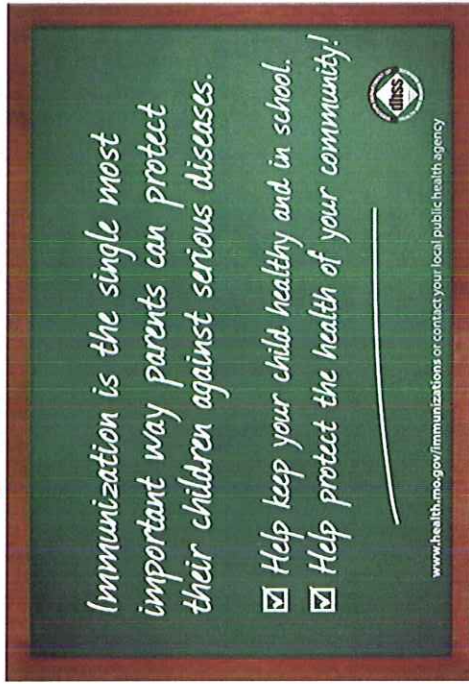

# Kindergarten Immunizations



# 8th and 12th Grade Immunizations

## Tdap and Meningococcal are Required for 8th and 12th Grade in Any Missouri School

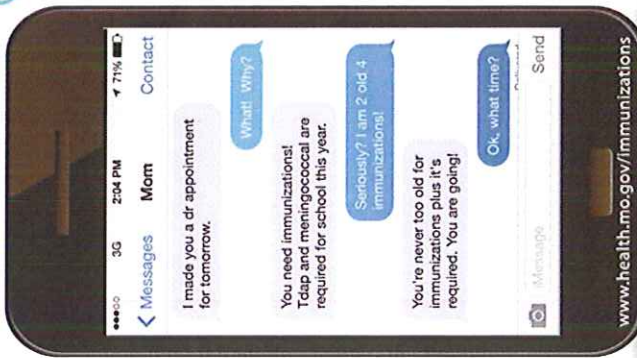
**Tdap (1 dose)**  
 Protects against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis.  
 • *Tetanus* - causes severe tightening of muscles, which can limit swallowing and breathing.  
 • *Diphtheria* - a throat infection that can lead to breathing problems, paralysis and death.  
 • *Pertussis* - (whooping cough) a contagious disease that causes violent coughing and makes it hard to breathe.  
**Meningococcal (MenACWY) (8th grade - 1 dose, 12th grade - 2 doses, unless first dose was administered on or after 16 years of age)**  
 Protects against bacteria types A, C, W and Y that can be spread through coughing, sneezing, kissing or sharing anything by mouth. Can lead to brain damage, loss of hearing, loss of limbs and even death.

## Other Recommended Vaccines

**Varicella (2 doses)**  
 Protects against chicken pox that can cause fever and an itchy rash. Can lead to skin infection, scars and pneumonia.  
**Influenza (1 dose annually)**  
 Protects against flu that causes fever, tiredness, cough and runny nose. Can lead to pneumonia.  
**Human Papillomavirus (HPV)**  
 Protects females and males against the most common types of HPV that could cause genital warts, cervical cancer and anal cancer.  
**Meningococcal B (MenB) (2 or 3 doses, depending on vaccine brand)**  
 Protects against some serogroup B bacteria that can be spread through close contact (coughing or sneezing) or lengthy contact (same household). Meningitis can lead to loss of limbs and even death.

## Vaccines for Children

Children may be eligible to receive free vaccines through the Vaccines for Children program before their 19th birthday. Contact the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services or your local public health agency to find out if your child is eligible.

## Vaccines Required for Children Enrolling in Kindergarten in any Missouri School

**Dtap (4+ doses)** (last dose on or after the 4th birthday)  
 Protects against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis.  
 • *Diphtheria* - a throat infection that can lead to breathing problems, paralysis and death.  
 • *Tetanus* - causes severe tightening of muscles, which can limit swallowing and breathing.  
 • *Pertussis* - (whooping cough) a contagious disease that causes violent coughing and makes it hard to breathe.  
**IPV (3+ doses)** (last dose on or after the 4th birthday)  
 Protects against poliovirus. Can lead to paralysis and death.  
**MMR (2 doses)**  
 Protects against measles, mumps and rubella.  
 • *Measles* - causes high fever and a rash; can lead to serious complications.  
 • *Mumps* - causes fever, headache and swelling under the jaw.  
 • *Rubella* - causes fever, rash and soreness or swelling of the joints.  
**Hepatitis B (3+ doses)**  
 Protects against Hepatitis B virus that can cause liver disease, including cancer.

**Varicella (2 doses)**  
 Protects against chicken pox that can cause fever and an itchy rash. Can lead to skin infection, scars and pneumonia.

## Other Recommended Vaccines

**Hepatitis A (2 doses)**  
 Protects against Hepatitis A virus that can cause fever, nausea and jaundice.  
**Influenza (1 dose annually)**  
 Protects against flu that causes fever, tiredness, cough and runny nose. Can lead to pneumonia.

## Vaccines for Children

Children may be eligible to receive free vaccines through the Vaccines for Children program before their 19th birthday. Contact the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services or your local public health agency to find out if your child is eligible.
