8 Ways to Prepare Your Child for Preschool

- 1. **Meet the teacher**: If possible, take your child to the Open House and let her play on the playground before school starts.
- 2. **Play dates:** Try to enroll her in a class where she already knows some of the other children. If that is not possible, ask if you can have the class list before your child starts school. You could offer to make your email available to the other parents so that you can arrange a play date before school begins. Perhaps several play dates can be arranged or you will meet someone who would like to exchange playtime. Do not be shy. The children will benefit from seeing a friendly face the first day of class.
- 3. **Practice separation**: Leave your child with others for short lengths of time so that they know you will return.
- 4. **Backpack and lunchbox**: Before school starts, help her be excited about starting school by empowering her to pick out a backpack. If she is staying all day, she will need a lunchbox. Keep in mind everything you have to fit in these items. In her backpack, she may need extra clothes, a special blanket or stuffed animal and small pillow. You may need to put an ice pack in her lunchbox. Fill it with food you know she already likes.
- 5. **Independent skills:** If your child is staying all day, ask her to help you prepare her lunch. She can stand next to you on a stool while you give her choices such as grapes or raisins, Grape or Strawberry Jello, and orange or apple juice. That way, she will feel like she has some control and will begin to understand what is really happening that day.
- 6. **Focus on your child:** Make the whole experience as fun as possible. Give your child your full attention on the way to school. Phone calls can wait. Tell her stories about when you were a little girl and how much you liked school. Sing songs. Try a spin-off version of "If you're happy and you know it, clap your hands". Make it, "If you're excited to go to school, clap your hands!" Be excited, smile a lot, and be happy for her.
- 7. **Communicate**: Tell her it is okay to be afraid, but that there are always adults to help her and she can ask for help anytime. Promise her that you will pick her up in a few hours or after a certain activity at school like when the teacher sings a certain song or reads the last book of the day.
- 8. **Do not linger:** When it is time for drop-off, **keep your goodbyes short, sweet and simple.** Give her a quick hug, tell her how much you love her, and leave her in the hands of the capable teacher. Even if she is crying hysterically, she will likely only cry for a few minutes once you are out of sight. However, if you linger, the crying will probably last longer.



Overcoming separation anxiety and adjusting to school may be gradual. Give her your full attention at home whenever possible. Ask and answer questions. Listen and bond with books and play. Tell her that you are proud of her for going to school. Reassure her with hugs and often tell her you love her. Then you will hear the greatest words on earth, "I wuv u too, mommy."






2016 ACES Summer Reading Program, On Your Mark, Get Set, Read!

2016-2017 Missouri School Immunization Requirements

- All students must present documentation of up-to-date immunization status, including month, day, and year of each immunization before attending school.
- The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) allows a 4-day grace period. Students in all grade levels may receive
 immunizations up to four days before the due date.
- For children beginning kindergarten during or after the 2003-04 school year, required immunizations should be administered according to the current Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices Schedule, including all spacing, (http://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/index.html).
- To remain in school, students "in progress" must have an Immunization In Progress form (Imm.P.14), which includes the
 appointment date for needed immunizations, on file and must receive immunizations as soon as they become due. The student is
 in compliance as long as he/she continues to receive the appropriate immunization(s) at the correct intervals according to the ACIP
 recommendations.

In progress means that a child has begun the vaccine series and has an appointment for the next dose. This appointment must be kept and an updated record provided to the school. If the appointment is not kept, the child is no longer in progress and is noncompliant. (i.e., Hep B vaccine series was started but the child is not yet eligible to receive the next dose in the series.)

 Religious (Imm.P.11A) and Medical (Imm.P.12) exemptions are allowed. The appropriate exemption card must be on file. Unimmunized children are subject to exclusion from school when outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases occur.

Last dose on or after the fourth birthday and the last dose of pediatric pertussis before the seventh birthday. Maximum needed: six doses.

3. Grade 8: One dose of MCV is required.

Grade 12: Two doses of MCV is required unless the first dose was administered to a student who was 16 years of age or older, in which case only one dose is required.

 Kindergarten-6 Grade: Last dose must be administered on or after the fourth birthday. The interval between the next-to-last and last dose should be at least six months.

7-12 Grades: Last dose on or after the fourth birthday. If all four doses are administered appropriately and received prior to the fourth birthday, an additional dose is **not** needed. Any combination of four doses of IPV and OPV by four-six years of age constitutes a complete series. **Maximum needed**: four doses.

- 5. First dose must be given on or after twelve months of age.
- 6. First dose must be given on or after twelve months of age.

Kindergarten-6 Grade: As satisfactory evidence of disease, a licensed health care provider may sign and place on file with the school a written statement documenting the month and year of previous varicella (chickenpox) disease.

<u>7-11 Grades</u>: As satisfactory evidence of disease, a parent/guardian or MD or DO may sign and place on file with the school a written statement documenting the month and year of previous varicella (chickenpox) disease.

 ⁸⁻¹² Grades: Tdap, which contains pertussis vaccine, is required. If a student received a Tdap, the student is up-to-date. Tdap is currently licensed for one dose only; an additional dose is not needed.



NEW MISSOURI SCHOOL REQUIREMENT FOR THE 2016-2017 SCHOOL

YEAR: One dose of Meningococcal (MCV) is required for all children entering the 8th grade. Two doses of Meningococcal (MCV) are required for all children entering the 12th grade unless the first dose was administered to a student who was 16 years of age or older, in which case only one dose is required. Avenue City has started its first garden club and it is really growing! Malinda Ehrhardt, from the Andrew County Health Department, approached administration and Ms. Davison about starting s school garden. The Andrew County Health helped start the program and has paid for all of our supplies thus far. Miss Davison has planned the gardens and led the club since school released for summer break. Al Atchity built and installed the raised beds. David Fankhauser hauled in and donated the dirt to fill the beds. Mrs. Proctor has donated a variety of milkweed and Mrs. Bertha Parker has donated many flowering plants. We have about a dozen members that come weekly to plant and tend to our garden. We have four raised beds and have planted many plants including tomatoes, jalapeno peppers, sweet bell peppers, miniature and large pumpkins, watermelons, squash, and strawberries. One bed has been reserved as a butterfly habitat, catering to the needs of the monarch butterfly. We have planted flowering plants to attract the butterflies and different varieties of milkweed, which is the only plant the young monarchs will feed on. The kids have planted, weeded, watered, and observed the plants each week throughout the summer. We are excited to have the chance to teach our young kids about cultivating their own food and plants, and eager to see how this club will develop in the future!
